THE 1956 STATE C. I. F. TRACK MEET

California's 1956 State CIF Track and Field championships will write the thirty-eighth chapter in the history of the finest high school track program in the nation, this afternoon and evening here at the Chico State College field.

Year after year the boys who wear the colors of their high schools make outstanding achievement and new state and national records something to be taken for granted, rather than looked upon as a rare occurrence. California's track and field program is looked upon by the rest of the nation as being tops. A brief review of the achievements of the high school boys throughout the nation shows why this is a fact.

On the 1954 high school National Honor Roll there were 159 names listed. Seventy-three of the 159 names were boys from California high schools. In the 16 events which are recognized by the National Honor Roll, California high school boys were the top performers in 11 events. Not only did California boys give the top performances in 1954, in 11 events, but they were second in 10 events. The brilliance of the all-around competitive

achievement of today's California high school performer is demonstrated by the marks in 1954 in the 440-yard dash, in the 180-yard low hurdles, in the broad jump, the shot put, the 120-yard high hurdles and the 880-yard relay events; in all of which California had three performances better than the best mark made by any boy in the other 47 states.

On the 1955 National Honor Roll 140 boys were listed. Forty-three California names and schools were included. Of the 16 events recognized, California was the top performer in 6 events.

When the 1956 National Honor Roll is compiled, many of the boys competing here at Chico State College today, will have earned themselves the highest recognition in national high school track and field circles. Certainly the excellent coaching provided by the high school teachers, the fine facilities of the California public schools, the spirited competition which is conducted under responsible high school athletic administrators, and the famed California climate have much to do with this outstanding record.

DEDICATION

Principal Floyd A. Johnson and Superintendent H. R. Olson, two highly respected elective members of the State CIF Federated Council, are retiring at the end of this semester after many years of unselfish service to the schools of California.



Floyd Johnson came to California in 1924, teaching at the Roosevelt Junior High School in San Diego. He served as Vice-Principal and Principal of Wilson Junior High in San Diego, and with the opening of the new Herbert Hoover High School in 1930, Mr. Johnson took over as Principal, the position he has held for the last 26 years. Mr. Johnson's deep and sincere interest in athletics has stimulated a well-rounded athletic program in his school. He served as CIF league representative as far back as 1934. In 1948 Floyd was elected a member of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee (Southern California area). In 1953 he was elected as one of two Southern Section Representatives on the State Federated Council, one of the highest honors obtainable in CIF ranks.

Harold R. Olson known through the San-Joaquin Valley area for his keen judgment and wit, rounds out a total of 33 years service in the education field this June. Mr. Olson has served as Principal of Hilmar High School, Superintendent of the Chowchilla Union High School, and since 1932 has been Superintendent of the Delano Joint Union High School. Mr. Olson has been an active worker in CIF circles for many years, and was elected President of the CIF Central Section in 1949. Since that time he has served as a representative of the CIF Central Section on the State CIF Council. While Mr. Olson is retiring as Superintendent of Delano High School, his fellow school administrators have prevailed upon him to accept a position as the Executive Secretary of the CIF Central Section. Delano's loss is the Entire San-Joaquin Valley's gain.



The school administrators of California through their elected representatives, including Floyd Johnson and H. R. Olson, have supported and guided California's high school athletic program so that it is now recognized as one of the finest in the nation.
