THE CIF: Doing the Job for Prep Sports Since 1914

In 1914, as high school athletic teams began crossing district lines to compete with neighboring schools, the CIF was established to provide consistency in sports rules and a safe, rewarding environment for young California athletes. Since that beginning, with fewer than 20,000 athletes, the organization has grown to become the largest youth agency in the state, serving over 500,000 young student-athletes each year.

During dynamic growth years, the CIF saw participation in high school sports double (for both boys and girls) between 1965-1975, and, although since 1978 some leveling-off has occurred in numbers of students participating, indications are that such a trend is due more to a lack of available school programs rather than to a lack of interest or desire on the students' part.


Few Californians realize that the CIF, the sole administrative body of interscholastic athletics, is an independent organization that has been carefully structured to provide needed services to the youth of the state without placing unfair burdens on the public education system. Athletic programs conducted in all 1200 secondary-schools in the state do not exist simply because students desire to participate in sports. The CIF utilizes the volunteer services of over 10,000 persons who are charged with the task of ensuring effective athletic programs for all of the public, private, and parochial high schools of the state.

As a result of effective planning, sound program administration, and a determination to support the philosophy that all student-athletes in our state should be provided with equal participation opportunities, the CIF has propelled California into uncontested leadership in the nurturing of outstanding athletes. Former and current California high school athletes hold more national records than do students from any other state – and our youngsters continue to be highly recruited by top-notch universities across the country. Many of the names are legend – Amy Alcott, Rick Monday, Bill Walton, Pat Haden, John McKay, Scott McGregor, Ron Cuccia, Jill Sterkel, Sherri Howard; all former CIF athletes, all outstanding men and women of whom Californians can be proud.

Although the CIF has been serving California youth for nearly 70 years and can boast of having over four million "alumni," many are unaware of the diversity of CIF administrative responsibility. Day-to-day activities of the CIF state office in Fullerton include enforcing regulations, establishing state calendars¹ of events, arranging and supervising state championships in four sports, maintaining individual and team sports records, providing publicity to the media, publishing the *State News*, and maintaining legal and insurance services which ensure the very existence of prep sports. In addition, 10 section commissioners throughout the state maintain full-time schedules to ensure that prep athletic events in their areas are operated effectively, safely, and consistently.

The support of the California public has been responsible for the success and expansion of California athletic programs for 68 years. With the continued cooperation and dedication of school superintendents, principals, and athletic directors, as well as the keen interest of over one-half million students and their families each year, the future of prep sports would appear to be bright and healthy. The CIF urges you to lend your support to our young student-athletes by attending high school sporting events in your community on a regular basis. The CIF welcomes you to this championship event; a showcase of some of our finest young California athletes – our nation's future leaders.







Salutes

Allen Dale Lacky, Honorary Referee for its 67th Annual Track and Field Championships

Allen Dale Lacky, a past president of the California Interscholastic Federation, is being honored by the host Sac-Joaquin Section as the honorary referee of the 67th annual CIF State Track and Field Championships.

Lacky, former principal of Woodland High School in Yolo County, is recognized as one of the outstanding leaders in prep athletics in the nation.

He is past president of the CIF, was its chief executive from 1977 to 1980, president of the Sac-Joaquin section from 1967 to 1978, a member of the executive board of the CIF from 1965 to the present, and a member of the CIF Protection Fund executive board from 1977 to 1980.

The 64-year-old native of Monmouth, Illinois, has been an instructor and school official at the University of Illinois at Urbana, Laguna Hills, and Woodland, California. His coaching career has taken him from the UI-Galesburg Extension School, to athletic director and a three-sport coach at UI's Laboratory High in Urbana twice, to the San Diego Naval Training Center as head track and cross country coach, and to Laguna Hills as head basketball and baseball coach.

Lacky was on the track team at the University of Illinois as a 100 and 440 man but says he "was no great shakes" as an athlete. He played some baseball for independent teams around the area and also was active in church league baseball.

He says he did not play college varsity sports as he did not have the time as he worked his way through school.

In the service he made some "all star" teams. His service career includes duty with the Navy in the Atlan-

tic and Mediterranean Theaters. He attained the rank of Lieutenant Commander in the US Naval Reserve and retired after 26 years of service. His reserve duty was at three bases in Illinois, and in Santa Ana, Sacramento, and Oakland after he moved to California.

His educational background includes a B.S. and M.S. from the University of Illinois and graduate work at San Diego State, Long Beach State, the University of Southern California, Sacramento State, Stanford, and UC Davis.

He has been a contributor to education journals and is authoring a book, *Jokes and Quotes for the Raconteur*.

He and his wife of 42 years, Patricia, reside in Woodland. They are the parents of four children, Terrence, Margaret, Michael, and Kathleen. He has received numerous honors and biographical listings including *Who's Who in the West*; *Who's Who in California*; *Personalities of the West and Midwest*; *Who's Who in the World*; *Two Thousand Men of Achievement*; and *Bicentennial Memorial Edition of Community Leaders and Noteworthy Americans*.

He currently operates Lacky Enterprises and Educational Consulting in Woodland.



STATE MEET CHAMPS

Since its inception in 1915, the annual California Interscholastic Federation state championships have been a showcase for future collegiate stars and Olympic gold winners.

The 49ers came to the Sacramento area in search of gold and found the Mother Lode loaded with rich ore.

It is no different for the prep athletes coming here. They will strike their goal of gold by moving on to college and perhaps achieving Olympic gold.

There is little doubt California is the nation's leader in producing track and field talent as well as being a leader in agriculture, business, industry, and entertainment.

Clarence "Bud" Houser of Oxnard, the State Meet champ in the shot put in 1920, 1921, and 1922, with a best of 55-4 1/4, captured the gold in the 1924 and 1928 Olympics. He also won a first in the discus.

Another Olympic champ who won the state shot put title in 1937 was Modesto's Wilbur "Moose" Thompson. He was the Games' winner in 1948 in a major upset. Like Houser, he was a USC Trojan star.

The Trojans dominated the spike sport for 38 years under Dean Cromwell, the "maker of champions." He produced Olympic champions in every meet from 1912 to 1948. His medal total was 24 gold, five silver, and three bronze. If USC had competed as a nation, it would have finished among the leaders every time.

A two-time State Meet winner from Hollywood, Lee Barnes shared the pole vault title in 1923, and won outright the following year. He won the 1924 Olympics with a vault of 12-11 1/2, the same height he cleared in the State Meet. He was another Cromwell, Trojan product.

Pasadena's Charley Paddock, a state sprint champ in 1916, 1917, and 1918, took first in the Olympic 100 meters and placed a relay victory in 1920.

Frank Wykoff of Glendale was another in a long list of USC's "world's fastest humans." He was state champ

in the 100 in 1927 and took gold medals with his fleet feet in relays in the 1928, 1932, and 1936 Olympics.

Foy Draper, state 100 champ from Huntington Park, in 1931 got a gold in the Berlin Olympics relay.

USC produced two Olympic high jump champs who were state meet winners. The first was Cornelius Johnson in 1936, and then Charley Dumas 20 years later.

Johnson of LA High won the state in 1932 and 1933. Dumas from Compton's Centennial won the state in 1955. He was the first human to clear over seven feet.

Randy Williams, an Edison of Fresno long jumper, won the State Meet in 1971 and triumphed in the 1972 Olympics.

Jim Hines of McClymons of Oakland was state champ in the 1964 100 and 200, and the 100 winner in the 1968 Mexico City Olympics with a world record.

Lemoore's Tommie Smith, the 1963 state 400 king, took the gold in the '68 games.

Compton's Ullis Williams, a two-time state 400 champ in 1960 and 1961, got a gold medal for his leg in a 1964 relay victory.

Two Olympic decathlon champs were winners in the State Meet. Tulare's Bob Mathias won in the 1948 hurdles and then went on to win in the Olympics the same year. He repeated in 1952.

Rafer Johnson of Kingsburg was a state hurdle champ in 1954 and won the gold in 1960.

Other California preps who won in the Olympics include Arnie Robinson in the '72 long jump; Parry O'Brien in the shot put in 1952 and 1956; Sim Kness in the '56 discus and Ken Carpenter in the '36 discus; Mel Patton in the '48 200 and relay; Lee Evans in the '68 400; Rex Cawley in the '64 400 hurdles; Mike Larrabee in the '64 400; and Earle Meadows in the '36 and Bob Seagren in the '68 pole vault.

Others won gold for contributions in relays, like Ed Hart and Jack Yerman.

The Golden Bear state can be proud of its Golden victories in the Olympics.



BRISCO-HOOKS CONQUERED A ROUGH ROAD

The girls division of the California Interscholastic Federation State Track and Field championships has produced its first Olympic gold medal winners.

The first individual winner was Valerie Brisco-Hooks.

Three gold medals and Olympic and American records. That's not bad for a practically unknown in international competition. But when the '84 LA Summer Games were over, everybody knew who Valerie Brisco-Hooks was.

She was the first person to win gold in the 200 and 400, a tough double to pull off. Even her idol, Wilma Rudolph, who has served as an inspiration to Val, won her triple gold in sprints (100,200, and relay).

Brisco-Hooks is one of 10 children who grew up in Watts, a tough LA neighborhood. A brother was killed by a stray bullet while working out on the track. His death tore up the 14-year-old Valerie.

She was the State Meet champion in the 400 meters in 1977, three years after her brother's death, while running for Locke High.

Val moved on to Cal State (Northridge) where she met Alvin Hooks. They were married, a son was born, and they moved to Philadelphia, where Hooks was a wide receiver for the Eagles. She put on weight and quit running.

In January 1983, they moved back to LA when Alvin was released. They began concentrating on her running. Together with her coach, Bob Kersee, they mapped out her future. Kersee told her if she got to work right away, she would win the 200 and 400 in the Olympics.

Val was not sure she could do it. Her husband helped her and became team manager for World Class AC. He made her work out when she didn't want to. He assumed the mother role, cooking and taking care of the baby while she trained.

They went to Europe last summer where she didn't win but made some prog-

ress. Back home she hit Weightroom hard. She and Alvin mapped out her Olympic goals.

First she won over favored Chandra Cheeseborough in the 400 by putting on the speed to overtake her and win in 48.83—the fourth best ever.

Then came the 200 two days later. This time she was the underdog to Jamaican Merlene Ottey and teammate Florence Griffith. It was Val's strength that produced the victory in 21.81 to better Evelyn Ashford's five-year-old mark.

Again two days later she joined Lillie Leatherwood, Sherri Howard, and Cheeseborough to set an American and Olympic record in the 4 x 400 relay. Val blew the race wide open by running the third leg in 49.23 to help her teammates to a 3:18.29 time—the second fastest time ever.

Sherri, one of the Howard sisters, won a gold for her relay performance and thus became the second State Meet champ to win an Olympic first place. She was the 1980 champ in 200 meters while running for Kennedy of Granada Hills.

Another gold medal winner in the LA Olympics was Jeanette Bolden in the 4 x 400 relay. She is remembered as a State Meet champ in the 1977 100 meters while running for Centennial of Compton.

IT'S NOT DOUBLE VISION

There is, in the case of Eric and Mark Mastalir, more than meets the eye.

What the eye sees is a case of double vision. Two Jesuit High School junior distance runners who are identical twins. They wear identical pairs of shoes, have identical haircuts, and run with identically efficient strides.

They are forever lumped together in the public's eye as the Mastalir twins. Mark and Eric, or Eric and Mark, depending on the meet results. Announcers don't even bother distinguishing between the two when they contest the same event.

"It does cause a lot of problems," said Eric, one of California's finest 3,200-meter runners. "I'll be out in front and I'll hear the announcer say, 'Mark Mastalir takes the lead.'"

"It probably evens out in the long run."

In the short run, however, it can be frustrating for both runners.

"We're individuals and we have different values and interests," said Mark. "People who know us remark about how we have different personalities."

Eric even falls victim to the same trap occasionally.

"When I'm asked a question, I even find myself saying 'we' instead of 'I,'" said Eric. "That bugs me."

Jesuit coach Walt Lange spends dozens of hours with the Mastalirs each week. His is a trained eye, and he sees two different people.

"Mark is a little looser than Eric, not quite as intense," said Lange. "Eric has a good sense of humor, too, but he's a bit more serious than Mark."

As runners, they possess similar but not identical abilities. Mark, fifth at 1,600 meters in last year's state meet, has a stronger kick than his brother. He regularly outsprinted Eric during cross-country races.

Eric, sixth in the state meet 3,200 in 1984, may have more endurance. He turned in a tough double at the Meet of Champions in early May, placing second behind his brother in the 1,600 (4:13.65 to 4:14.26) before winning the 3,200 in 9:17.60.

Eric plans to double in the 1,600 and 3,200 at this year's state meet in Sacramento. His primary objective will be to break the 9-minute barrier in the 3,200.

"If I can get under 9 minutes, I'll help out Mark in the 1,600," said Eric.

Mark will keep a close watch on the 3,200. A fast pace might take something out of Belmont's Roman Gomez, a double winner in Los Angeles a year ago who will be tackling the same exhausting task in Sacramento.

"I wouldn't mind seeing a fast pace in the 3,200," said Mark. "People who are doubling will have run three hard miles by the time the 1,600 starts."

Such thoughts were far from both runners' minds when they enrolled at Jesuit in the fall of 1982. The only splits they knew were those called out by a swim coach.

Looking for something to do in the autumn, they went out for the cross country team. Both were among Jesuit's top five varsity runners and contributed to the Marauders' Sac-Joaquin Section championship.

They swam in the spring, not venturing onto the track until the next year. They weren't exactly fish of out water, both placing in the state meet in their rookie seasons.

"I'm not really surprised by what they did last year in track," said Lange. "What surprised me was how well they did as freshmen in cross country."


They have traveled great distances this spring, searching out the best competition. At the Arcadia Invitational in April, Eric placed second in the 1,600 behind Gomez. Mark, who was boxed on the first lap and spent the rest of the race trying to move up through the crowded field, was seventh.

At the Mt. SAC Relays, Eric was second at 3,000 (8:35.8) and Mark was third in the 1,500 (3:54.8).


They know the distance races at Hughes Stadium will be fast, and they're eager to match strides with the Gomezes, Whiteleys and Gazianos.

"In the state meet, you're racing people," said Mark. "You just assume that you'll get a good time."

In the Sacramento area, the Mastalirs seem like they've been around forever, so complete has been their dominance. Yet they still have another year of high school left, another year of one-two finishes and confused identities.

SALUTING SHEILA HUDSON

Sheila Hudson paced the infield of the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum last June, absorbing the sights and sounds like a magnet.

She was competing in the California state championships, triple jumping in the same pit the Olympians would use two months later. Hudson placed third with a lifetime-best distance of 40 feet, 4 inches.

She watched Woodside's Wendy Brown and Berkeley's Yvette Bates wage a fierce duel, with Brown's 42-10½-setting a national high school record.

Ascending the awards podium alongside Brown and Bates raised Hudson's adrenaline to the boiling point.

"The whole way that meet was set up, with the Olympic atmosphere, was just great," said Hudson. "I was trying to concentrate on my jumps but I took everything in at once."

Ten months of subsequent highs and lows have not dimmed Hudson's recollection of that glorious day. Now she wants to make her own history.

"I decided then that I was going to work as hard as possible," said Hudson, a Rio Linda High School senior. "I want to break the national record."

Hudson improved her personal best to 40-9 in an early-April meet and believes the record is within range.

"I'm pleased with the way my season's been going," she said. "I've been working hard and I feel I have the technical aspects down well enough that I can just go out and jump now."

Hudson is more than just a triple jumper, however. She is the Sac-Joaquin Section's best long jumper (19-3½) and ranks among the leaders in the 300-meter hurdles (44.08 seconds). Her talent in the other events leaves her in something of a quandary.

"I'll try to qualify for the state meet in all three events but I have mixed feelings," she said. "I'd like to just concentrate on the triple jump but if I make it all the way in the other two events, I'll compete in them too."

Triple jumping has had a cathartic effect on Hudson this spring. An outstanding prep basketball career ended on a sour note when Rio Linda was upset by Roseville in the Sac-Joaquin Section Division II championship game at UC Davis.

Rio Linda had previously defeated Roseville by margins of 28 and 29 points.

"It took me a long time to get over that," said Hudson, an All-Metro guard who averaged 18 points a game. "Track helped me forget about it."

If keeping busy will help Hudson forget, she's on the road to complete recovery. The Meet of Champions showcased Hudson at her busiest best. She placed fifth in the 100-meter hurdles, won the triple and long jumps, and was second in the 300 hurdles.

The triple jump, that balletic combination of speed and spring, is her top priority. She competes under the scrutinizing eye of her boyfriend,

former Rio Linda basketball star Elmo Paige.

"We read all the books we could on triple jumping this summer, and we watched Willie Banks (the American record-holder at 57-7½) on videotape," said Hudson. "I'm not going to get the record by just going out there and jumping."

"I want to make sure I have everything covered, so I won't have any excuses if I don't get it."

Record or no record, Hudson will take her elastic legs and sharp mind to the University of California in the fall. A 4.0 student, she was a finalist for the California Interscholastic Federation's female Scholar-Athlete of the Year award.

Women's triple jumping is still in the formative stages. This year's state finals marks but the fourth year the event has been contested in California.

Hudson, who is half-Korean, hopes it will be added to the women's schedule at the 1988 Olympic Games, which will be held in Seoul. That is an optimistic wish, since other nations have not yet embraced the event.

The triple jump consists of three separate yet intertwined segments — a hop, step and a jump — and Hudson's high school career is likewise breaking down into three related phases.

Los Angeles, and the thrill of competing against the best, represents the first. The despair of Davis, where her basketball season came to such a rude halt, was the second phase.

She thinks those disparate memories will motivate her as she attacks the third and final jump.

Jim Davis spent a total of 33½ years in education as a teacher, coach, and administrator. He spent nearly 30 years of this at Amador High in Sutter Creek.

He coached football (1955-1975), track (1955-1975), and basketball (1955-1965 and 1975-1977). His track teams won nine varsity titles, four B, four C, and five frosh-soph. His team won the A subsectional title in 1965.

He gave up coaching to become vice-principal and athletic director in 1977. He filled this assignment with firmness and compassion until his retirement in 1984.

Jim was respected and loved by all students, athletes, sports associates, and cohorts.

None of this would have happened if he had gotten the job he wanted as a truck driver in Amador.

Throughout the years, Solis has had several Central Section Champions, state qualifiers and All Americans. Some of the outstanding athletes include Dorathia Gaf-feney, All American (19-2 long jump); Tammy Shaw (14.4 100 m low hurdles); Lauri Dew (5-7 high jump); and Kattie Meyer (2:17.3, 880).

As a teacher of English and a coach, Faye Johnson's philosophy stresses the importance of the intellectual athlete. She believes the successful athlete is the intelligent athlete. Therefore, her training techniques, which began ten years ago, emphasizes this. For two summers prior to her arrival at Los Angeles High, she assisted an Olympic coach in the NCAA summer youth program at Cal State Los Angeles, where she developed her coaching philosophy and techniques.

The last eight years have produced athletes who have competed at the state and collegiate levels in track and in other sports. Currently she coaches volleyball and has assisted with cross country. She also has produced championship cheer squads, plus the drill team and pep club. She now serves as a track and field advisory member for the LA City Section of the CIF and is head judge in long jump competition.

TRIVIA

Clarence "Bud" Houser was a six first-place winner in the shot put and discus in the State Meet. He competed from 1920 through 1922. Houser, now 82, is the oldest living USC Olympic Games Champion. He pulled an Olympic double in 1924.

Three of the eight girls' 3200 meter runs were taken by Vicki Cook of Alemany (Mission Hills). Her first win was in 1980.

The first 15-foot pole vault in the State Meet was by Paul Wilson of Warren (Downey) in 1964, at 15-4¼. The next year he went 15-6½. The meet record is 17-0¼ by Anthony Carran of Encino's Crespi in 1978.

Washington of L.A.'s Jodi Anderson was the winner in the first three long jumps in the State Meet. Her best effort was 20-0¼. Last year's champ was Wendy Brown of Woodside with 20-9¾, the meet record.

Reynaldo Brown of Compton was the State Meet's first 7-foot pole vaulter. He did it twice, in 1968 and 1969. In 1971, Glendale's Dwight Stones upped the mark to 7-1.

Louis Zamperini, the 1934 State Meet winner, set a national HS record in the mile that went unbroken for 20 years. Then at USC he set a national collegiate mark of 4:08.3 that stood for 15 years.

LESLIE MAXIE Mills High

If you're not familiar with the name Leslie Maxie, you should be. For starters, she's been to the State Meet—and has been a high placer or winner—ever since she was a freshman at Mills High in Millbrae. She was also named Track and Field News Women's High School Athlete of the Year last year.

And for good reason. She was already one of the nation's best sprinters—in 1982, she set a national freshman record in the 400 (53.76), and in 1983 she set a national sophomore record in 200 (23.44) along with winning the State Meet 100 hurdles as a freshman and as a sophomore.

The summer after her sophomore year, she ran her first ever 330-yard hurdle race. At an all-comers meet in Los Gatos, she waltzed through a 41.7 to make her the second-fastest prep in history.

That was all before 1984, and 1984 was a year to remember for Leslie. She was on a tear from the start, and by the end she had broken the national high school record for

300H or 400H a total of five times. By season's end she had lowered those records to the incredible performances of 40.18 (300H) and 55.20 (400H). She won the State Meet 300H easily. Her 400H time was also a World Junior Record, and the second-fastest by an American of any age. She was second in the TAC Senior Championships and fifth in the U.S. Olympic Trials—the highest finisher of any prep woman. The next-fastest 400 hurdler on the all-time prep list was more than two seconds behind her.

But 1985 wasn't as kind to Leslie—in her first meet, an all-comers in January where she ran a 23.4 200, she experienced a triple stress fracture in her leg. She spent most of the whole year rehabilitating and was able to start racing only on April 27 in hopes of making her fourth appearance at the State Meet.

"If it turns out well," she explains, talking about her 1985 season in early May, "I'll be happy and surprised. But I know it's not the end of the world."

TRIVIA

Los Angeles mayor Tom Bradley was one of the star athletes who qualified for the state championships in 1935 in Fresno, but was not permitted to compete. The 440 man, who went on to star at UCLA, was out of action as the CIF declared the LA stars would not be able to vie due to a ruling of the LA Board of Education which barred athletes from the State Meet. The CIF was angered by the LA ruling.

Other athletes not allowed to compete because of the "silly whim" of the school board were Louie Zamperini of Torrance, the world interscholastic mile record holder; Phil Graves of Hollywood, the state's fastest half-miler; and Ray Young of Riis, the state record holder and CIF defending champ.



Los Angeles has been the host city for the State Meet more times than any other place. LA hosted the second meet in 1916 at the YMCA field. The first time at the Coliseum was in 1926, just after its completion. LA has also been the meet site in 1923, 1929, 1933, 1939, 1949, 1952, 1955, 1961, 1964, 1969, 1971, and 1984. Fourteen meets in all have been in the City of the Angeles.

Berkeley High ran up the highest scoring total ever in the State Meet with 58 in 1981. The year before Berkeley totaled 41.

Sacramento has been the site of State Meets four times prior to this year. In 1919, the event was held at the Sacramento Fair. In 1959, 1979, and 1982, Hughes Stadium was the scene of the meet, as it is in 1985.

The active San Francisco 49er stars own national high records: Mike Carter holds the honors in the shot put at 77-0; Renaldo Nehemiah ran the 110 high hurdles in 12.9; and Russ Francis in the javelin at 254-11.

HENRY THOMAS
Hawthorne

Every once in long, long while, a sprinter like Henry Thomas comes around. These guys seem to have success written all over them, but the amazing thing about them is that they keep getting better.

Thomas never ran track before his freshman year at Hawthorne High, but by the end of that season he recorded a PR of 48.57 in the 400—a national age-14 record.

His attention turned to the shorter sprints in his sophomore year, Henry blazed PRs of 10.46 and 21.02. The 100 time was a national sophomore class and age-15 record, while the 200 time was just .02 off the national soph record.

He won the 200 at the State Meet as a soph and took second (by just .02) in the 100. In the last race of the evening on a hot Bakersfield night, Thomas anchored his Hawthorne 4 x 40 team to victory in a scintillating time of 3:10.11. But that victory wasn't easy for him—he needed to hold off Danny Harris of Perris High. Harris is probably better known for winning a silver medal in the Olympics last year in the 400 hurdles.

Thomas got faster his junior year (last year). He led the country in the 100 (10.27), and was second fastest in the 200 (20.73) and 400 (45.82). The 100 time made him the fastest Californian ever and the third fastest in prep history. The 400 time gave him the national age-16 record. He won both the 100 and

200 at the State Meet, and anchored his 4 x 100 team to second and his 4 x 400 team to first—the latter in 3:02.45, to become the third-fastest high school in history.

Hawthorne won the team title in both 1983 and 1984 and will be looking for three straight this year. Already this year the school has broken (with Thomas running well on each) the national prep records in the 4 x 400 (3:07.40) and the sprint medley (3:21.15). Thomas ran a 44.5 split in the 4 x 400 record.

WE'LL MISS YOU HENRY

We are sorry that Henry Thomas will not be able to defend his Sprint title in tonight's meet, he recently underwent surgery.

We wish him a speedy recovery and success in his future endeavors.

TRIVIA

The first State Meet champion was Manual Arts of Los Angeles in 1915, with Otto Fritsch the coach. Manual repeated in 1916.

Girls competition began in 1974 with Berkeley the winner. Berkeley repeated in 1976 and scored three straight victories (1981, 1982, and 1983). Willie White coached Berkeley to five wins in 11 meets.

DARCY ARREOLA
Grossmont High

Darcy Arreola is one athlete who is happy to see the elimination of the Southern California Regional Track & Field Championships. The versatile middle to long-distance runner from La Mesa's Grossmont High of the San Diego Section will long remember, but would just as soon forget, last year's SoCal meet.

Poised to pounce on the leaders from her fourth-place position in the 800-meter finals, Arreola clipped the heels of the runner in front of her and suddenly was spawled on the track as the others pulled away with only 200 meters remaining. She gamely got to her feet but finished last. It could have been a devastating experience for a sophomore, but Darcy Arreola is no quitter. If anything, it made her more determined.

At the Arcadia Invitational earlier this year, Arreola ran her fastest 1,600-meter time—4:57.29, and wasn't sure how to react. She thought the time was fine, but finishing fourth was a disappointment. While most of the other runners in the 1,600 warmed down, Arreola warmed up. She came back less than a half-hour later to finish second in the 800, running 2:14.68, her best of the season. Arreola turned in another impressive double a week later at the Mt. Carmel Invitational.

Pushed by Palo Verde (Arizona) High's Laura Goodwin, Arreola won the 1,500 in 4:39.4. Again she had just enough time to jog around and watch the rain move in prior to facing Newbury Park's Melissa Sutton in the 3,000.

The defending section 800-meter champion (2:12.8) also captured the large-enrollment 3A cross-country championship last year. She finished ninth in the Kinney Cross Country Western Regional.

Arreola's 4:57.29 marks her as one of the top milers and a 10:39.8 in the Mission Viejo Invitational 3,200 also ranks among the top 10 marks in the state this year.

Madera High



As a junior, he capped a successful dual and invitational season by capturing the 1600 m and 3200 m California State titles. During the season, he led the nation at three distances. As a senior he has defended his wins in the Arcadia 1600 m and distance medley relay. And he has tacked on the Mt. SAC 1500 m and two excellent 800 m efforts at the Pasadena Games and Mt. Carmel meets. Can history repeat?

A coach can wait a lifetime for an athlete like Roman. He is unique in that he has sprinter speed (under 50 in the quarter) and the endurance of a distance runner (30 minute 10 K). And the desire to excel!

LATRESE JOHNSON
Clovis High

In one meet last year, Latrese Johnson changed from being a 5-10 high jumper who took fourth in the State Meet all the way up to a 6-2 national junior champion.

The progress in that meet (the TAC Junior Championships held in Los Angeles in conjunction with the U.S. Olympic trials) was for Johnson—or anyone—awesome. The Clovis senior's PR before the meet was 5-10, but she cleared 5-10½ and 5-11½ on her first attempt. She needed three attempts, but she also got over 6-0¾ for her third PR of the day.

But she wasn't finished. Her first-attempt clearance of 6-2 gave her her fourth PR of the day and the victory on the count-back over national record holder (and defending champion) Lisa Bernhagen and State Meet champ Wendy Brown.

That 6-2 performance made Latrese fourth on the all-time national high school list, but this spring Latrese has done even better.

On March 15 at the North Yosemite League Relays in Sanger, Johnson tied the national high school record of 6-2¾ set by Bernhagen in 1983. She has lost only once this year, to Anaheim's Yleana Carrasco at Arcadia, both jumping 6-0.

Johnson didn't entirely come out of nowhere last year. Although she took fourth in the State Meet, she had already been a state finalist as a freshman in 1982. That year she took third and had a seasonal best of 5-9, which made her the second-highest freshman in the country that year.




Steve is a graduate of UC Santa Barbara, where he was a sprinter.

Last year she won the State Meet 400 in 52.67, but had a season-best time of 52.32, which not only led the nation but also made her the tenth-fastest prep in history. She also anchored her Locke High (Los Angeles) 4 x 400 team to victory in the State Meet in a blazing 3:38.65—fastest in the country last year and the second-fastest high school ever. Her split was 51.5.

She also competed well in the State Meet last year in the 100 (fourth in 11.75—the sixth fastest prep in the country) and the 100 low hurdles (third in 13.61, but her best of 13.49 was second-fastest in the country and made her number six all-time among preps).

Choo Choo didn't just come out of nowhere last year. The year before (1983), she won the State Meet 100 hurdles (13.88—seventh fastest prep of the year in the U.S.) and was second in the 400 (53.27—second-fastest prep in the country).

Already this year she has PR'd in the 100 (11.66) and the 200 (23.2), and once again she is one of the most feared sprinter/hurdlers in the country.

She comes from the same high school (Locke) that Valerie Brisco-Hooks attended.

Brisco-Hooks made history last year by winning Olympic gold medals (and setting American and Olympic Records) in the 200, 400, and 4 x 400.

MARTIN PEDIGO

San Diego High

San Diego High School is the flagship of San Diego Unified School District, the second largest school district in California, and Martin Pedigo is the admiral of track and field coaches in the San Diego Section.

After 26 years of coaching track and cross country (the last 23 years at San Diego High), Martin is weighing anchor from coaching and teaching and setting sail into the sunset of retirement. The list of athletes and teams who benefited from his influence during his leadership and guidance is impressive. Individual and team honors aside, Pedigo has been a positive influence on thousands of young adults. For the record, his teams have won 12 league track and cross-country championships. In addition, four of his track and field teams were section champions. But far more meaningful than mere statistics are the intangibles—dedication, service, loyalty, support, understanding—that were so much a part of Pedigo's professional life. Bon voyage, Martin!

TRIVIA

Jefferson of Los Angeles won four successive State Meet titles (1949 through 1952) under coach Estel Johnson. Jefferson won three other titles.

BRIAN BLUTREICH

Capistrano Valley High

Last year, Brian Blutreich made his name as a shot putter, and it was a very good one.

He won the event at the State Meet (64-7 3/4), turning back a good duo of Greg Aitkenhead (Mission Viejo) and John Bender (Shafter). Blutreich, now a senior at Capistrano Valley High in Mission Viejo, had a best mark last year of 68-4 1/4, which made him the second-best prep in the country.


He was looking forward to a great senior year, but he was set back last summer while training for the Pan-American Junior Championships in Nassau, Bahamas. Blutreich stretched the ligaments in his throwing wrist while training and wasn't able to continue in the shot. So he took up the discus.

In 1984, he was "just" a 179-1 thrower, but his concentration and hard work have been successful enough for him to have difficulty now throwing under 190 feet. His best of 210-8 not only is the best in the country this year by a prep, but it is also the second-best performance ever by a high schooler.

So which event is Blutreich exceeding at now? Both. He's coming around slowly and cautiously in the shot, not wanting to aggravate his injury, but already he's put 66-6 1/2, by far the longest in the state this year.

Blutreich, already the farthest-throwing California prep ever in the discus, will undoubtedly be looking to add similar laurels in the shot, where the all-time state best is 69-3 3/4 by Jim Neidhart (Newport Harbor, Newport Beach), in 1973. After that, he'll be going for 70 feet, a barrier that only six preps in history have ever surpassed.



JEFF ROGERS
Overfelt High (San Jose)

Jeff Rogers got his first break as a sophomore back in 1983. The Overfelt High (San Jose) senior had jumped 6-8 that year, but wasn't favored to win his section meet (Central Coast Section), as Half Moon Bay's Craig Branstrom was the leading entry at 6-11.


But unfortunately for Branstrom, also a leading hurdler, he fell in his 110 hurdle heat and was injured. Rogers saw the door was open, so he went through it and won the CCS Meet at 6-8, equaling his season best.

Last year he did even better. He won the CCS Meet again (a meet record-equaling height of 6-10), won the NorCal Meet (6-8), and finished second in the State Meet (6-11, equaling his season best). Also a fine triple jumper, he took fourth in the CCS (45-5¼) but didn't qualify to the State Meet.

Several times last year, Rogers threatened to become the first CCS jumper to ever clear 7-0, but to no avail. This year he got it—and more—in one of his first meets of the season as he cleared 7-1 in early March.

Jumping over 6-10 in nearly every meet this year, he has yet to lose, even traveling south to win the prestigious Arcadia Invitational. His triple jumping has also improved this year, as he leads the CCS at 47-3½, and he hopes to qualify for the State Meet in that event as well.

CALVIN GAZIANO
Castro Valley High

Calvin Gaziano is a young man who doesn't like to lose—which means he usually wins. The 18-year-old Castro Valley High School senior went undefeated all through the recent 1984 cross-country season (except a DNF at the Kinney National Championships). So far in the 1985 track and field season he remains undefeated, with big wins at the Fresno Bee Games and the Bruce Jenner Invitational.

Although he started his athletic career as a soccer player he showed early signs of track greatness. The Tony Casillas-coached runner had sophomore best marks of 50.3, 1:55.8, 4:11.1, and 8:58.5. It took an automobile accident to defeat him in the 1984 track season by eliminating his junior season of competition. However, he got right into his senior season by recording fast early times of 8:55.7 for two miles and 8:21.5 for 3,000 meters, both indoors.

The Texas A&M-bound Gaziano says his favorite event is the mile, but his biggest performances so far have been at the longer distances, especially cross country, where he has won the California High School Cross-Country Runner of the Year Award for the past two years. However, his goal remains—to run a four-minute mile soon and then culminate his fear of losing by winning the Olympic 1,500 meters.
